A few years later they reconnected in Connecticut to work on the score for It Comes At Night (A24, 2017) which then led to them working together on the documentaries Hail Satan? (Magnolia Pictures, 2019) and the 2-part Emmy-winning PBS Frontline series Documenting Hate (PBS/ProPublica, 2019).
